October 19th

Off the Map by Fergus Fleming features forty-five gripping accounts of some of the most amazing feats in the history of exploration. These are summarized between three "ages of exploration." From the Renaissance golden age of Columbus, da Gama, and Magellan to the twentieth-century heroics of polar explorers such as Peary, Scott, and Amundsen, this is an unforgettable journey into the annals of adventure (amazon.com). The Dangerous Book for Boys by Conn and Hall Iggulden. Equal parts droll and gorgeous nostalgia book and heartfelt plea for a renewed sense of adventure in the lives of boys and men... The Chemung County Library District has a familiar but also foreign ring to it. Established by the voters in November 2005, the Library District has adopted policies, created a strong committee structure, assumed ownership and responsibility for library buildings, prepared and passed budget proposals, won grant awards, and been validated by the New York State Board of Regents with its permanent charter. By now, this qualifies as old news. What shouldn't get lost in the mix of organization-building are the real library heroes: the staff members of each of our neighborhood libraries. Here are a few of my library heroes: Janet & Cassie, at the Big Flats Library, plan and conduct regular story hours, as do Dianne and Ahnece at the West Elmira Library, Glenice at the Horseheads Free Library, and Chris and Michelle and Tami at Steele. Bill makes sure the Bookmobile is on the road, meeting its customers at regular stops throughout the County, just as Bonnie opens the doors for public library patrons in Van Etten every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Owen conducts classes on searching the Internet at Steele, when he's not busy answering questions from the reference desk or maintaining the Library District web page. To these and every other Library District staff member, providing public library service is more than a profession and a career: it's a calling to participate in public education, to provide information to the public when they need it and where they need it. These and every other Library District staff member are the real library heroes, and my sincere "thank you for a job well done" goes out to them.

Treasurer's Report – A Banner Year

The Friends of the Steele Memorial Library donated a total of \$27,475, in 3 rounds of giving, since September of 2006. A newly appointed Allocations Committee spent much time exploring needs with library staff, and endeavored to be responsive. The West Elmira Library and the Big Flats Library each received \$8875: \$5750 for special programs and \$3125 for materials. \$1375 was earmarked for the Bookmobile to enhance its programs and materials for children. The Steele received \$7375 to support additional programming for children and adults. Finally, in an effort to enhance the access to library services for children on the south side of Elmira, we gifted the Southside Community Center with \$975 to underwrite 10 trips to the Steele, once each month during the school year, for children who attend the center. An additional 3 trips were scheduled so that those children can attend special programs at the Steele.

KINDERBOOK REPORT – OCTOBER 2007

The 2007 *Kinderbook* program is progressing as planned. The program, in its fifth year, attempts to introduce kindergarteners to the county public libraries. The program encourages parents to sign their children up for public library cards and to visit public libraries with their children to borrow books and learn about the available children's programs.

This year, members of the Children's Committee visited Chemung County schools at both kindergarten registration and orientation to encourage parents to complete library card application forms for their children. To date library card application forms have been completed for 531 kindergarteners – up from 453 in 2006.

This year, for the first time, kindergarten field trips are being planned to introduce kindergarteners to public libraries. The field trips will include a special story presentation, a tour of the library, and stickers for all. Kindergarteners will receive a gift book from the Friends along with their library card.

We continue to look for ways to improve the *Kinderbook* program. We hope the addition of public library field trips will result in more kindergarteners receiving and using their applied for library cards.
